Measles is in Wellington (Health New Zealand notice)

You may be aware there have been recent measles exposures in Wellington. Please see the below advice about measles for our school whānau I families.

What is measles

Measles is a very contagious viral illness that spreads easily between people and makes most people feel very unwell. Measles can cause serious health problems and about 1 in 3 people with measles will need hospital level care. Complications are more common for tamariki under five, pregnant people and people with weakened immune systems.

Vaccination and immunity

Measles spreads very easily and can affect anyone who is not immune. Being immune to measles means you are protected from getting infected and spreading the disease to other people. You are considered immune to measles if either of these things apply:

- You had two doses of a measles vaccine after 12 months of age
- You have had measles before.
- Most people born in New Zealand before 1
 January 1969 are considered immune
 because before that time, almost everyone
 had measles as a child.

A reminder that:

- There have been measles cases confirmed in Wellington
- Check the published Locations of Interest in case they may have come into contact with the measles case.
- Watch out for measles symptoms fever, cough, runny nose, sore eyes, and a blotchy rash.
- Keep students home from school if they have any measles symptoms and ring a doctor or Healthline for advice on 0800-611-116.
- Check if your whānau are immune to measles and find medical records, such as immunisation records or test results, to confirm this. For more information on checking your immunity visit info.health.nz/measles-immunity. It is safe
